Beyond the Wall: Making All Things New



hen have you discovered newness in life through Christ? Did you have to step out in faith to do so? Perhaps you had to let go of your will and accept God's will. This

is a major turning point in the faith journey of many people. There are examples in Scripture about Job (Job 29-30), Elijah (I Kings 19:4-14), Mary Magdalene (Luke 8:1-2) and the women at the tomb (Luke 23:55 – 24:5). Consider the story of the rich young man (Matthew 19:16-26, Mark 10:17-31, Luke 18:18-30). He approached Jesus with a simple question: "What must I do to inherit eternal life?" Jesus replied, "Go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven." When the young man heard this, he was very sad and walked away, because he was very rich. Given the choice, he found it difficult to forsake wealth in this world for the promise of God and eternal life.

Sometimes there are barriers or walls that complicate trying something new or stepping out in faith. What walls or barriers have you encountered? Consider the story of Zacchaeus (Luke 19:1-10), who wanted to witness Jesus preaching but was too short to see past the crowd. After Zacchaeus climbed a tree, Jesus called out to him and invited himself to lunch in Zacchaeus' home. We know what Jesus said to Zacchaeus,

and he was a different person afterward. He had changed from wanting wealth and success in this world to desiring significance through a life of faith. When have you, or your congregation, chosen success over significance? Perhaps when using numbers or the size of your facilities as a measure. Moving toward significance usually means sacrificing success. In what areas of ministry is your congregation seeking significance today?

Stepping out in faith may be a personal choice for a short time but usually involves accompanying others. As members in the body of Christ, we are not called to meet our own needs alone. The Great Commission (Matthew 28:16-20) calls us to go beyond our barriers and bring the message of Jesus Christ to others. This helps us grow beyond a Christian enclave to become servants of Christ and a serving community. In what ways has your congregation moved from an enclave to a servant community?

Overcoming barriers and walls to make things new involves stepping out in faith. It means shaking loose from lethargy and moving out from sheltered comfort. In the process we break the chains of sin that hold us back and divide us from making us one in Christ. When we share in the distress of God's heart to do the kingdom's work, we are in tune with God's will, choosing significance over success and becoming a servant community. This is when we feel the vitality of our faith and the power of the Holy Spirit. May you experience this newness in Christ in and through your ministry.

In June of 2018 Sky Ranch came to lead Vacation Bible School at Trinity. Approximately 15 – 18 children attended. Youth also went to Sky Ranch Camp with the aid of camperships, sponsored by Trinity's budget.

The Women's Bible Study continues to meet on Wednesday mornings at Trinity at 10 am. There are 14 - 15 women whom faithfully attend.

Reading The Bible, a 2-year program at Trinity, is being led by Jennie Lawrence. Anyone can simply hop into where the group is reading. The next meeting is February 10th.

Becky Dill: Youth Group

The Youth Group of Trinity offers a safe environment for youth from Trinity, the Methodist, and Baptist Church to meet and experience emotional and spiritual growth. There is approximately

20 kids whom get together on a regular basis.

Martin Greller: Social Ministry

There are people active in social ministry outside the committee structuring. The concern is for those whom may wish to become involve, with ideas, but don't know how or where to express their ideas. Perhaps in the future Trinity may have more of a structuring committee to capture these ideas and talents.

Janet Boss: Family Promise

Thanks to Mike Nutter for leading Family Promise during 2018.

The Family Promise committee currently has Molly and Ray Bredehoft, Janet and Steve Boss, Kris and Larry Oolman, and Denise Greller.

In the year 2018 Trinity served 9 children and 8 adults. These people were hosted somewhat quarterly throughout the year.

In 2019 we have hosted 2 families in January. Family Promise and Trinity have created a safe environment for these people. For those helping with this ministry, we are offered a chance to provide stability and a loving atmosphere for people whom depend on us for shelter and food. This is often a trying time for these families; thanks to volunteers we try to smooth out some of the rough patches. There are many areas in which to serve; our next family comes early March.

Diahann Jablin: Local groups

There are many local groups such as AA, Alanon, Laramie Kennel club, 4-H groups as well as Girl Scout Troops that utilize the different rooms within Trinity to conduct their business. These groups represent approximately 125 people whom come into our doors.

Kevin Cox: Gruver Room remodel

The demolition for this project began in September 2018. The electrical and framing have been inspected. The plumbing for the heat is forth coming. The insulation will be installed and inspected. The drywall will shortly follow. The goal is to have the Gruver Room completed by March. The congregation will be kept posted when work is available for others to partake in.

The Christmas Beer and Hymn Sing was an example of a fellowship activity that brought forth people for conversation, laughter, and singing. This event was held at the Depot, advertised, to invite the general public into a more relaxed atmosphere for Christian fellowship.

Pastor Nate shared that visioning needs to be addressed. What does the congregation want to focus on? What types of ministry do we want to do? What kind of footprint do we want to leave on Laramie? What do we want people whom attend a funeral at Trinity, to come away with, and what will they say about us?

Pastor Nate thanked Trinity members in supporting Lutheran Good Gifts. By people's donations, we were able to buy a farm for Lutheran Good Gifts. We were able to buy 2 farms, on the special day that gifts were doubled!



2019 Pastor's Report

You have heard me say that I have the best job in the world. My call to Trinity has been a gift. I know that I am not the perfect pastor for Trinity, but I truly enjoy the relationships that we have formed and the ministry that we do together. I often say, "I love working for a forgiveness based organization," which is the central theme to what Jesus has given through the cross. May we continue to be a safe place for all people to gather around the font and the table to receive the gifts of God which empowers us to increase compassion and to welcome whoever finds their way to us. May God once again wash over us with courage, grace, and a vision as we look forward to another year of ministry together. Here are a few reflections as I look back on 2019 and wonder with curiosity what is coming in 2020.

- 1. Youth Ministry: This last year we blessed Becky Dill, our youth minister, for her next journey and we welcomed Sean Stayton to lead this ministry. Sean has done an amazing job leading our youth with Lock-Ins and other youth events. Andrea and I continue to teach confirmation to 3 youth and Jen Zenor, Lutia Stayton, and Jacob Burnett lead our Sunday School ministry.
- 2. Increased Opportunity for Worship: At last year's annual meeting we discussed the possibility of starting a midweek worship service. Last fall Trinity started a Wednesday evening worship service with a meal to meet the needs of those who do not work traditional hours as well as for those who are not able to attend a Sunday service. The Wednesday worship service is call Oasis, which is a time for worship attenders to find peace in the middle of their busy week. We offer this new ministry due to the hard work of this congregation to complete the Gruver Room Remodel. I also want to especially thank Shane and Andrea Toven for dedicating many hours to update the Gruver Room with the gift of technology.
- 3. **Fellowship:** It's easy to forget about the many hours it took to complete the Gruver Room, but this new space has been vital and is truly the heartbeat of our congregation. Worship is central to who we are, but fellowship or what I call relational ministry is needed for us to stay connected. Our fellowship spaces are crucial areas of ministry to engage each other and new potential members. People who come to a congregation are

- seeking a relationship with God, but also with you and the Gruver Room is the place where this ministry flourishes.
- 4. Serving our communities: As an ELCA congregation I'm excited to see the various ways we can reach out to serve our community and also the world. During Christmas we once again focused on the ELCA Good Gifts program to support families and communities around the world and we also collected winter gear to help our community face the elements. Trinity continues to serve through Family Promise. Family Promise is a ministry where congregations open their door to provide safe housing a week at a time for those who have no home. Family Promise assesses the needs of each family and works with them daily to manage and reach their family goals. This year the church council will be discussing the possibility of starting a Homeless Day Center were vulnerable people could come to Trinity to receive a shower, a place to wash clothes, a safe quiet place to rest, and some nourishing food. I have been meeting with the Directors of Interfaith and Family Promise to see how Trinity could rise up to meet these needs in Laramie.
- **5. Stewardship:** This year I continued to witness your generosity. Each year we discuss a budget and wonder what sort of ministry God invites us into and each year you dedicate your gifts to such ministry. It is a beautiful thing to see that whenever there is a need, you the people of God at Trinity respond.
 - a. Your generosity helps youth experience the gift of Christ through Sunday school, confirmation, Senior high ministry, Leadership Lab, and campus ministry. You are partnering with the congregation as we share God's love and grace throughout the generations.
 - b. Your generosity enables us to share our building for ministries like Family Promise, AA, and Girl Scouts.
 - c. Your generosity enables us to build relationships with God through worship and fellowship by paying our organist and choir director to lead and enhance our faith through the gift of music.
 - d. Your generosity enables your pastor to engage those who are homebound, grieving, lonely, and in despair. Your gifts grant me a salary to serve our community of faith through a diverse ministry.

- e. Your generosity empowers Andrea, our Office Manager to provide great communication with the bulletin, website, email updates, The Hub, and slides in the Gruver Room. She does an amazing job leading the Worship Band and keeps this place running smooth.
- f. Your generosity has created the Campus Cabinet which addresses the need of those who are food insecure. We also use your resources to buy gift cards from Safeway to give to those who come to Trinity seeking assistance.
- 6. Staff of Trinity: I am blessed to work with such a dedicated and faithful staff at Trinity. I give thanks to God for our staff listed below. You'll notice how many organists are listed. We continue to have a lot of turnover with our organists, which means that our members need a special thank you for leading our worship during the times our other organist are absent.

You'll notice that our membership has gone down considerably. When I was called to Trinity I was given the total number of members which was over 400 people. This number is fairly high, considering our worship attendance is around 80-90, so I asked Andrea to go through our rolls and to make an adjustment of who is an active member and who will be placed on the inactive member list. An active member is someone who has attended worship at Trinity in the last year. On our old rolls we had a large number of people who are no longer living in the area. To give a better representation of Trinity Lutheran we are creating a list as good as we can that is who we are today. As your pastor our worship attendance is a clearer representation of who we are. Our membership numbers are difficult to track as people may or may not inform us when they stop attending or starting attending somewhere else. Our current active membership count will certainly miss a few individuals, but we have attempted to bring some realistic counting to our rolls instead of keeping our overinflated membership count.

To get you thinking, consider the following: What ministry should we continue? Where should we focus our energy? Who are we not serving and welcoming into God's word? What would a viable committee/project structure look like in practice?

As a Council, we asked each of you to faithfully consider your ability to give to Trinity this year. You responded to our call in the spring when expenses were surpassing income. Notions about classic church will be challenged as we live into Church Becoming.

Forming a vision for **Messiah Mountain Retreat Center** will provide another opportunity to ask new questions. How might this site equip us for deep spirituality and passionate service?

This is but a taste of God's transforming work among us. Thanks to you and your investment in what matters most, we are taking the next faithful step into the Spirit's ever-unfolding future. 2019 By the Numbers

- Lutheran Advocacy-CO advocated for 10 bills at the legislature, leveraging \$3.5 million in state funds and \$1.7 million in federal funds
- Lutheran Advocacy Ministry-NM welcomed 160
 Lutheran and ecumenical partner advocates at the annual Bishop's Legislative Luncheon.
- Educate, Equip, Enact (3E) saw 22 congregations participate in Stewardship for all Seasons, and 18 rostered ministers received grants to address financial challenges.
- **62 people in the candidacy process** are being accompanied from discernment to their first call.
- 14 new members of RMS Youth Council were installed at synod assembly.
- 40 part-time pastors and deacons gathered for a ministry gathering and formed an ongoing network of support and learning for those serving part time calls.
- **303 Zoom videoconference meetings** enabled Leaders to connect across our vast geography.
- **47.5% of mission support** received in our synod was shared with our Churchwide Organization.

WHERE DOES MY OFFERING GO?



ELCA members in more than 9,300 congregations in the United States and Caribbean give approximately \$1.75 billion in regular offering to support ELCA ministries in their local communities and worldwide. When members give through their congregations, a percentage of that money is then shared with the local synod and the national churchwide organization.

This unrestricted giving, called Mission Support, gives us both the foundation and the fuel to do God's work in the world and a portion of the gifts circle back to support ministries in synods and local congregations. Of these unrestricted gifts, the churchwide organization receives around 2.6 percent. This represents the largest portion of the ELCA churchwide organization's operating budget.







<u>Thank you</u> again for your support of the ministry at Sky Ranch Lutheran Camp. You are one of the congregations of the Rocky Mountain Synod who use, own and operate this camp. **As a seasonal Ministry, we serve over 3,000 youth and adults each year.**

Thanks to the generous support of an anonymous couple, **Sky Ranch dedicated the new Ruth cabin on May 11!** The \$700,000+ summer staff/seasonal retreat cabin has 4 bedrooms with bathrooms, capable of housing 32 summer staff with a meeting area and two external bathrooms.

Your financial support allowed Sky Ranch to again finish in the black. Additionally, two designated gifts allowed Sky Ranch to create a **new \$100,000 General Endowment Fund** with the ELCA Foundation. At the same time, we continue to reduce our loan. Sky Ranch has reduced its liabilities by over \$600,000 during the past six years!

Other Sky Ranch Highlights:

- We have been upgrading other facilities to meet a growing demand from retreat groups.
 Volunteers combined to contribute over 2,000 hours of service to improve facilities and grounds at Sky Ranch. Last summer we:
 - Ran new power to the cabin housing the Camp Store
 - Installed a new metal roof on Tubman cabin
 - Constructed several new low rope elements for camper use
 - Installed heaters in the downstairs bathrooms of the Lodge
 - Built new picnic tables and benches for exterior of Ruth Cabin
- Sky Ranch has a rich tradition of training staff to be church leaders regardless of their vocation. Of the 15 college graduates on last summer's staff, Sky Ranch has:
 - Two at ELCA Seminaries (Southern and PLTS)
 - One serving as a Youth Director at a congregation in the Midwest
 - Four serving with YAGM (Young Adults Global Mission)
 1 in Jerusalem/West Bank, 2 in Australia, and 1 (2018 staff) in Rwanda
 - Four serving as teachers and one in Graduate School (Chemistry)

Did you know? Sky Ranch owns 117 acres of land and maintains 26 buildings and facilities. In this outdoor setting, dynamic college-age counselors ignite the faith of youth and adults alike and are inspired in their own faith.

Only 2/3 of the camp's budget comes from program fees. Your financial support is vital to keeping camp affordable! We hope you will include Sky Ranch in your missional budget and continue to support this ministry.
